In compliance with the Americans With Disabilities Act, if you need special assistance to participate in this meeting, you should contact Administration at 503.691.3011. Notification thirty-six (36) hours prior to the meeting will enable the City to make reasonable arrangements to assure accessibility to this meeting.

PROCESS FOR LEGISLATIVE PUBLIC HEARINGS

A *legislative* public hearing is typically held on matters which affect the general welfare of the entire City rather than a specific piece of property.

- 1. Mayor opens the public hearing and identifies the subject.
- 2. A staff member presents the staff report.
- 3. Public testimony is taken.
- 4. Council then asks questions of staff, the applicant, or any member of the public who testified.
- 5. When the Council has finished questions, the Mayor closes the public hearing.
- 6. When the public hearing is closed, Council will then deliberate to a decision and a motion will be made to either *approve*, *deny*, or *continue* the public hearing.

PROCESS FOR QUASI-JUDICIAL PUBLIC HEARINGS

A *quasi-judicial* public hearing is typically held for annexations, planning district changes, conditional use permits, comprehensive plan changes, and appeals from subdivisions, partititions and architectural review.

- 1. Mayor opens the public hearing and identifies the case to be considered.
- 2. A staff member presents the staff report.
- 3. Public testimony is taken:
 - a) In support of the application
 - b) In opposition or neutral
- 4. Council then asks questions of staff, the applicant, or any member of the public who testified.
- 5. When Council has finished its questions, the Mayor closes the public hearing.
- 6. When the public hearing is closed, Council will then deliberate to a decision and a motion will be made to either *approve*, *approve with conditions*, or *deny the application*, or *continue* the public hearing.

TIME LIMITS FOR PUBLIC HEARINGS

The purpose of time limits on public hearing testimony is to provide all provided all interested persons with an adequate opportunity to present and respond to testimony. All persons providing testimony **shall be limited to 3 minutes**, subject to the right of the Mayor to amend or waive the time limits.

EXECUTIVE SESSION INFORMATION

An Executive Session is a meeting of the City Council that is closed to the public to allow the City Council to discuss certain confidential matters. An Executive Session may be conducted as a separate meeting or as a portion of the regular Council meeting. No final decisions or actions may be made in Executive Session. In many, but not all, circumstances, members of the news media may attend an Executive Session.

The City Council may go into Executive Session for certain reasons specified by Oregon law. These reasons include, but are not limited to: ORS 192.660(2)(a) employment of personnel; ORS 192.660(2)(b) dismissal or discipline of personnel; ORS 192.660(2)(d) labor relations; ORS 192.660(2)(e) real property transactions; ORS 192.660(2)(f) information or records exempt by law from public inspection; ORS 192.660(2)(h) current litigation or litigation likely to be filed; and ORS 192.660(2)(i) employee performance of chief executive officer.

CALL TO ORDER

Mayor Ogden called the meeting to order at 5:30 pm.

1. Financial Analysis of Water Supply Options.

Public Works Director Jerry Postema introduced Nicki Pozos from HDR, Inc. to present the water supply financial evaluation results. Ms. Pozos explain the City's current water supply comes from the Portland Bull Run Watershed and the Columbia South Shore Well Field. In addition the City has its own Aguifer Storage and Recovery system and emergency interconnections with Lake Oswego, Tigard, Sherwood and Wilsonville. Last December, the Council was presented with other water supply developments within the region and the possible benefits to the City. There was also discussion on the cost impacts and other criteria associated with each water source. This financial evaluation will compare projected costs for these water sources over the next 30 years.

Ms. Pozos explained the City of Tualatin will require additional water supply within the next 10 years. She shared the comparison between the Portland supply and the Willamette River Water Sources and the potential rate projections. She said the analysis relies on a number of assumptions including the following: 1) Options dependent on partnerships with other agencies, 2) Portland rate structure is very complex, 3) Relies on reasonable and best information available within the period and scope of the study. The study compared expansion of the Portland supply to switching to the Willamette River. She explained the limitations of the analysis and within those limitations the Portland Supply rates were estimated to be lower than the Willamette Supply option over the 30-year period. The study also evaluated hybrid options, where the use of the existing Portland supply was maximized and then expanded to the Willamette. Within the limitations of this analysis, the Portland Supply was estimated to have similar relative rates to the hybrid options by the end

of the 30-year analysis period.

She concluded saying depending on Portland's future investments in their water infrastructure, there is the potential for any of the options presented to have the lowest relative rates by the end of the 30-year period.

Councilor Bubenik asked if the projections factor in the cost of buy-in. Ms. Pozos stated the projections assume for service in 2026.

Mayor Ogden commented that buying into the Willamette later will not be cheaper, and the additional capital costs for Portland beyond five years is unknown. He commented on the risk analysis of a 100 year old system.

Councilor Truax stated cities have to participate in funding the costs for the pipe in order to use it in the future. He said there are serious unknowns and risks that cannot be analyzed. He said this presentation is informative, but there are no decisions to be made right now.

Councilor Grimes asked about neighboring water supply and capacity for Tualatin tapping into these systems. Ms. Pozos replied neighboring supplies will be able to meet the demands in the future.

Councilor Davis stated she agrees with Councilor Truax that there are no decisions to be made at this time. She commented on Tigard's desire to sell Tualatin water and suggested a cost analysis on that scenario. Ms. Pozos stated Tigard is interested in short term supply as they have excess currently but over the long term this is not an option.

City Manager Lombos stated there will be an update on the Willamette Water Supply project and 124th project at the next work session.

2. City Facilities Study Update.

Deputy City Manager Singer presented information about the City Facilities Study project. She shared a PowerPoint presentation which provided an update on the space requirements study from YGH Architecture and the projected square feet required for future City offices and library space. This data was compiled by YGH using industry standards in addition to interviews with City staff. YGH projected the City will need approximately 25,464 of usable square feet for City offices for the next 20 years, and approximately 32,230 usable square feet for the Library. The study also looked for complimentary adjacencies to determine which City functions should be located next to each other for maximum efficiency.

Manager Singer shared an update on the public outreach process noting the following methods which have been used to reach the community: paper survey, fliers, the online #TualatinTownHall forum, briefings to Advisory Committees and CIOs, newsletter articles, e-news blast, social media and Spanish outreach materials. Share shared some of the preliminary results of the survey and discussed the feedback received from the February Open House. She said the next Open house will be held on April 16, 6:30 pm, at the Library.

Manager Singer shared some of the alternatives being reviewed by YGH including the expansion of the existing library, new construction next to the Police Department, and the Oregon Nurses Association building on Lower Boones Ferry Road. She said additional alternatives and the cost information for each alternative would be presented at the April 16 Community Open House, and would also be available for review and comment on the #TualatinTownHall online forum.

Mayor Ogden asked about the time frame for the project. Manager Singer said the Task Force will meet on April 29 to discuss the outcomes and a potential recommendation to present to the Council in May.

3. Council Advance Debrief.

City Manager Sherilyn Lombos presented a summary of the January 9 and 10, 2015 City Council Advance, including agreements, priorities and next steps. She explained the Council Advance was an opportunity to reaffirm the Council's vision, set priorities for the coming years and think about how to maximize effectiveness with Council and staff. She shared information about the eight priority projects including Basalt Creek, Marijuana, Development Code Review, Local Transit, Regional Transit/SW Corridor, Water Supply, Parks Master Plan, and the City Hall/Town Hall. She reviewed the framing process and decision-making process, and the credimus the Council discussed at the Advance. Manager Lombos said staff is working with the facilitator to create a graphic placemat summarizing this information.

Management Analyst Kelsey Lewis and Parks and Recreation Manager Rich Mueller gave a presentation and shared information about Arbor Week. This is the 28 th year the City of Tualatin has been recognized as a Tree City USA. There are many events and activities planned for Arbor Week.

Council President Beikman read the proclamation declaring April 5-11, 2015 as Arbor Week in the City of Tualatin.

Councilor Davis shared information about Volunteer Appreciation Week. 1. 2014 Annual Report of the Tualatin Planning Commission

Planning Manager Aquilla Hurd-Ravich and Planning Commission Chairman Alan Aplin presented the Tualatin Planning Commission 2014 Annual Report. Chair Aplin stated the Planning Commission reviewed and approved the 2014 Annual Report at their meeting on February 19, 2015. The report includes a survey and report of activities of the Planning Commission. In 2014, the Planning Commission reviewed and made recommendations on a Plan Text Amendment and a Plan Map Amendment. Additionally, they reviewed and approved a Sign Variance and a Height Variance. The report includes details about their activities.

2. 2014 Annual Report of the Tualatin Park Advisory Committee

Parks and Recreation Manager Rich Mueller and Tualatin Parks Advisory Committee Chair Dennis Wells presented the 2014 Annual Report of the Tualatin Parks Advisory Committee. Chair Wells presented the recommendations the committee made during 2014 including public parks, playground-related activities, and programs. A complete list of recommendations for future projects was provided by the committee.

1. Consideration of <u>Ordinance No. 1379-15</u> Allowing Marijuana Facilities In Light Manufacturing, General Manufacturing, and Manufacturing Business Park Planning Districts with Certain Restrictions; Allowing Homegrown Marijuana Outdoors with Certain Restrictions; Amending Tualatin Development Code Chapters 31, 60, 61, and 64; Creating New Chapter 80; and Adding New Provisions (PTA-15-01)

Councilor Brooksby was phoned in.

MOTION by Council President Monique Beikman, SECONDED by Councilor Wade Brooksby for second reading by title only.

MOTION by Councilor Bubenik, SECONDED by Councilor Davis to substitute a 3,000 foot buffer for a 1,000 foot buffer in paragraph 2 and separation of linear feet distance from 2,000 feet to 1,000 feet.

DISCUSSION

Councilor Bubenik stated the original 3,000 foot buffer and the 2,000 foot linear separation between facilities is not reasonable and way too restrictive.

Mayor Ogden stated 1,000 feet does not accomplish the objective of separation. Councilor Bubenik noted the state only requires a 1,000 foot separation for medical marijuana facilities.

Mayor Ogden stated Oregon has determined cities do not have the option to ban these facilities but have the ability to regulate them according to time, place and manner restrictions. Councilor Bubenik stated the council cannot ban medical

marijuana facilities but citizens can ban retail through the initiative process.

MOTION FAILED

MOTION by Councilor Bubenik, SECONDED by Councilor Davis to amend section 80.060 to remove the 3,000 square feet size restriction on facilities for grow operations.

DISCUSSION

Councilor Bubenik stated the city should not restrict the size of facilities and should let the market determine the size. He stated such a restriction is unreasonable.

Mayor Ogden stated he disagrees with allowing the market to drive how large a grow facility is in Tualatin.

DISCUSSION ON ORIGINAL MOTION

Councilor Truax stated it is unreasonable to treat marijuana facilities differently than a liquor store. He feels forcing commercial activities into industrial parks is unreasonable. He does not support this ordinance.

CITIZEN COMMENT

Kevin Luby, stated he is speaking personally and on behalf of his clients who are interested in growing an industry that is soon to be legal in Oregon. He spoke in opposition to the ordinance and urged the council to separate the medical and recreational marijuana issues.

Cathy Holland spoke in opposition of the ordinance. She spoke on behalf of the Commercial Citizen Involvement Organization (CCIO) stating the group feels the ordinance is overreaching and a 3,000 foot buffer is not justified and unreasonable.

Linda Moholt,on behalf of the Tualatin Chamber of Commerce, spoke in opposition to of the ordinance. She stated the ordinance is unnecessarily restrictive and the state requirements are sufficient.

COUNCIL DELIBERATIONS

Councilor Grimes stated the discussion needs to be about how the community will look and grow while taking state requirements and fitting them into Tualatin. She explained surveys showed citizens supported medical marijuana but also want to keep it away from parks, school, residential areas and day cares. She said the 3,000 foot buffer is in response to the community and is reasonable for Tualatin.

Councilor Davis explained she feels the ordinance will not limit the black market and it will still exist to sell to youth. She believes existing state regulations are effective and does not want to take the risk of potential legal action with this ordinance.

Councilor Bubenik stated the marijuana measure passed at the state and City level. He stated the 3,000 foot buffer will only allow two facilities in Tualatin.

Mayor Ogden stated a 2,000 foot separation would allow for several facilities along Herman Road.

2. Consideration of an Intergovernmental Agreement between City and Metro to fund planning and public involvement efforts related to the Southwest Corridor

Assistant City Manager Alice Cannon and Management Analyst Zoe Monahan presented a PowerPoint. Manager Cannon explained the presented IGA will allow the City to participate in the public involvement process related to the Southwest Corridor project. She stated the cost is \$80,000 in FY 2015 and \$80,000 in FY 2016. She provided a work plan summary. The IGA explains Metro is responsible for project management and will lead the public involvement and decision making process, while the City will be participate in the Steering Committee, the staff project team, and technical review.

CITIZEN COMMENTS

Gary Bray spoke in opposition of the IGA. He stated approving the execution of this IGA goes against the charter amendment that was passed to allow citizens the right to vote on transit decisions.

Jan Guinta spoke in opposition of the IGA. She suggested the Council consider looking at other Metro documents. She stated the word "planning" is being used to get around the citizens right to vote.

Steve Shoppe spoke in opposition of the IGA. He explained it is the citizens desire for the public to vote before spending city resources on transit.

COUNCIL DELIBERATION

Councilor Grimes explained the IGA allows the City a seat at the table for discussions on high capacity transit. She explain it is important for the City to participate in order to have a voice in the discussion. Manager Cannon added that the IGA would allow the City to participate in public involvement and planning for potential future projects.

Mayor Ogden explained the region is engaged in studying this corridor and are looking at high capacity transit and the question of where an alignment will go. He explained the potential impacts to Tualatin and the need to be part of the discussion. Mayor Ogden stated if the City does not fund the study the project will continue on and the citizens will not be able to be involved in the analysis. Council President Beikman agreed with Mayor Ogden and stated this IGA allows Tualatin the ability to look at all the options available to the City. She stated she is favor of the IGA and that it is not in breech of the charter amendment. Mayor Ogden stated funding for design and construction of this project would come through a public vote. Councilor Bubenik stated this IGA includes public involvement where the previous failed IGA's did not. He noted it will be important for Metro to drive public involvement and education.

MOTION by Council President Monique Beikman, SECONDED by Mayor Lou Ogden to authorize the City Manager to enter into an Intergovernmental Agreement between the City and Metro to fund planning and public involvement efforts related to the Southwest Corridor

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY:

Annually the Oregon Liquor Control Commission (OLCC) requires all liquor licenses be renewed. According to the provisions of City Ordinance No. 680-85, establishing procedures for liquor license applicants, applicants are required to fill out a City application form, from which a review by the Police Department is conducted, according to standards and criteria established in Section 6 of the ordinance. The liquor license renewal applications are in accordance with all ordinances and the Police Department has conducted reviews of the applications.

According to the provisions of Section 5 of Ordinance No. 680-85 a member of the Council or the public may request a public hearing on any of the liquor license renewal requests. If such a public hearing request is made, a hearing will be scheduled and held on the license. It is important that any request for such a hearing include reasons for said hearing.

FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS:

A renewal fee of \$35 has been paid by the applicant.

From President Art Sasaki:

2014 has been another memorable year for your Society. The purpose of this first-ever printed annual report to members, prepared in collaboration with Larry McClure, is to review our accomplishments—including our financial picture—and set the stage for a new year. I would like to point in particular to one of my own goals for the year just past: start reaching future generations to continue the work of THS.

Last December we granted free one-year memberships to the 20 young people and their parents who completed requirements for the Discovering Tualatin History contest. This was a culminating activity right before the Centennial time capsule was buried near the Heritage Center. Hopefully when they reach adulthood these youth will remember what they learned about their city and be active in preserving our history.

In May, about a dozen Boy Scouts worked to reconfigure our Pioneer Garden at the west end of our campus as part of an Eagle Scout project. Now we hear they are interested in doing something more there in the future.

Later in May, thanks to the outstanding effort by Chris Tunstall and her gang of volunteers, we enabled 275 fourth graders and another passel of adult helpers to re-live what pioneer life was like in Tualatin. We continue to get reports from young people in high school who fondly remember when they came to the Heritage Center for Pioneer Days several years ago when we first launched this major outreach effort.

In June, we awarded our 2014 \$2000 scholarship to Tualatin High School senior Chia-Ni Shen. She is presently attending the University of Oregon and we look forward to hearing her progress.

In September, perhaps the most attention-getting event for Tualatin 2014 history was the awesome bronze statue of a little boy gazing at an 8 ft. high (baby) mastodon which is the centerpiece for the Nyberg Rivers mall. We have made a half-hour video of the opening day ceremonies which featured Yvonne Addington highlighting Tualatin's Ice Age connections plus the DVD includes other dignitaries participating that day. Focus was on children and the release of a new children's book called *I Wonder* which is on sale at the Heritage Center.

As 2014 ends, we are preparing invitational letters to the adult children of THS members who need to be thinking about carrying on the legacy others have worked so hard to build. These newer generations need to prepare to carry our batons on.

For those of us who are now members, I encourage and applaud your efforts to make contributions to THS that match your interests, strengths and temperament. Even as we all grow older and our energy may diminish, our age and experience can be leveraged to empower and build passion in others.

The mission of our Society is preserving, interpreting, and promoting Tualatin's history while our talented members help create local history as well.

Membership Overview

Membership coordinators Norm Parker and Karin Olson report we have a total of 247 members which included 20 youth who were given one-year memberships due to their participation in the Centennial. We were saddened by the deaths of Bill Gleason, Adrienne Heathman, Earl Itel and Monty Montague. New members are Ross Baker, Fred Bruning, Joan Hamilton, Peggy Mala, Donald Seury, Margaret Torgeson, and Rochelle Wandzura. Financial Picture of THS

We are lucky to have Barbara Stinger as our treasurer. She works diligently to track our income and spending and keeps reminding us in Board meetings about where we are either ahead or behind on budget. She makes sure we have a planned budget ready for the start of each new fiscal year starting July 1. We are presently half way through the 2015 fiscal year working with an anticipated budget of over \$50,000. To accommodate increased costs for operations, the board voted to raise dues by \$5 for 2015. There has not been a change in dues for several years. What follows is a general summary of what we typically take in and spend. Final figures will be compiled after books close June 30, 2015.

Income

Rental of THC: \$11,458; Annual auction: \$10,450; City of Tualatin subsidy for Center operations: \$7,100; Memberships: \$4,145; Donations to scholarship fund: \$2,080; Donations to print book: \$1750; Grants: \$500; Product sales (books, jam): \$1324; Donations at the door and at programs: \$500; Patio engraved bricks: \$150. An unexpected windfall this year was the donation of two new books for our Gift Shop for which we had no development costs: *Selected Photographs from Tualatin's History* (printed under auspices of the City of Tualatin, Paul Hennon) and *I Wonder*, a children's book published by CenterCal (spearheaded by Fred Bruning, Chad Hastings and Kimberly Blue) to celebrate the opening of Nyberg Rivers shopping center. Both these products are available for \$10 each.

Expenses

Your historical society is at work year-round, often behind the scenes on computers at home, in committee meetings or with our many partners in the community. We keep our Tualatin Heritage Center doors open to the public at least five days a week and many times in evenings and on weekends. In the meantime, institutions bigger than ours are often unable to operate regular hours. With more volunteers we could even extend our minimum four hours on weekdays. We are grateful to have Lindy Hughes in her seventh year as our on-site manager. Lindy is the mentor for our Experience Works trainee Rhonda Verbeck whose salary for 18 hours/week is paid through a federal employment program. Rhonda is learning practical skills as she also helps keep the Center humming. Costs for staff are on an annual basis, \$25,192; Operational expenses like postage, printing, supplies, telephone and internet services, \$3290; Contract services for bookkeeping, speakers, \$2500; Insurance, security system and equipment maintenance cost \$2420; Fundraising expenses, \$1500; UV shield added to all windows on main floor this year, \$2080; Scholarship, \$2000; Other operational costs, such as monitors for certain rentals, \$1268.

Savings

In addition to temporary funds held in a money market account averaging \$40,000, Barbara monitors a \$27,000 CD held in part for future exhibits and building modifications as the Board of Directors determines. The Board has appointed a fundraising committee to prepare a plan to address future financial needs. Special events are on the horizon to begin building an endowment-type fund to assure long-term financial footing.

We Thank Our Supporters

Many persons provide gifts of money, time and in-kind items that assure our ship stays afloat. Some wrote checks for a very specific purpose, like re-making our "Tualatin from the Beginning" book or supporting our scholarship program.

Rentals of the Heritage Center provide the foundation of our operations. Our staff works hard to maintain this flow of support. Our largest single source of rental income comes from monthly art classes and business networking groups. We are a popular venue for anniversary celebrations, memorial gatherings, concerts and business forums. These and other uses of the building for City functions bring in hundreds of persons who typically take time view our exhibits and some even buy our products after taking a closer look. Some of our users give back to the Society through in-kind gifts: Mask and Mirror Community Singers staged a fundraiser in April and split the proceeds 50/50. Women of Watercolor (WOW) donated gift cards and art for our 2014 auction. Our knitting club donated several items for the auction as well.

Our major fundraiser for THS is the always-fun September auction which is headed by Barbara Stinger and Lindy Hughes. The return this year was \$10,450. Here is a review of why this year's auction was such a success:

Generous donors gave 10 items with retail values ranging between \$200 and \$1000. Twelve items on the auction block had retail values estimated between \$100-200. Over 40 persons/organizations donated 95 items valued up to \$100, including for the popular Wine Wall where \$25 guaranteed a minimum \$25-valued wine and the chance to pull a mystery bottle worth as much as \$50. \$25 tickets in the annual raffle offered a chance for a week in Las Vegas with \$500 to spend. The winner was Jack Bracke of Beaverton. THS member Sue Raxter has now sold two winning raffle tickets since this popular offering began! Many volunteers helped plan and carry out this annual gathering on a warm summer evening. We are indebted to them all.

Is Tualatin Historical Society a Beneficiary in Your Will?

THS Artifact Collection Grew in 2014!

Our "curators" who carefully preserve the material culture of Tualatin were excited this year to receive the gift of a "coverlid" that came to Tualatin over the Oregon Trail. Donated to THS by Tim Mayfield, a descendant of the Ball-Robbins family, the hand-woven coverlet from an 1836 hope chest was likely made on a home loom from wool spun on the farm. Lois Roby, Evie Andrews and Loyce Martinazzi meet at the Heritage Center usually once a week and have now documented over 290 items (or groups of items) upstairs at THC and also kept safe at an off-site unit donated by Tote n'Stow on Tualatin Road. They have many more artifacts to enter into a database. Lois, the record keeper, guesses the total will be closer to 400 and counting. We always wish we had more documentation and stories that belong to each

treasure like the autograph book, the branding iron, the WWII ration books, early Boy Scout uniforms, the old Christmas ornaments, local school and business memorabilia and the story behind the large 4-tined metal spear!

Centennial Capsule Buried for Future Historians

The final event for Tualatin's Centennial occurred December 19 when a time capsule containing many items collected by THS and others was buried near the Heritage Center. It is to be opened 50 years from now. Photos, print materials and even some artifacts were included, as well as letters to the future students and residents of Tualatin written by today's generations. Tell your grandchildren to look forward to this!

Visitors to THC Enjoy Exhibits and Displays

In the 12 months since our last annual meeting, our Heritage Center staff has logged 9,662 persons walking through our doors, many more than once. Diane Swientek coordinates our permanent and revolving displays which these persons see. Always on exhibit are the bones/tusk from long-extinct local giant fauna and relics from the original Tualatin Methodist Church, our home. Changing exhibits this year were: "Downtown Tualatin" (examples: 1930 gowns/shoes/bags); "Past and Present" (examples: hand/electric can openers); "Spotlight on Donations" (1847 Batty Peace black powder flask); "Salute to Veterans" (WWII Red Cross uniform, pictures of Tualatin vets, bugle); "Cooking in Tualatin" (linens, cooking utensils, cookbook, crockery, apron); "School Days" (toys, books, school memorabilia); "THS Gift Shop" (all our books); "Tualatin Treasures" (Robbins coverlet).

Tualatin History on View Other Places, Too!

More Ice Age artifacts and information are on display in (and on top of) our THS case at Tualatin Library. A permanent display about the early town high school is in a lobby display case at the new Tualatin High School, featuring both artifacts and photos of people who were legends of their time. Visitors are welcome.

Cabela's and New Seasons both approached Tualatin Historical Society about including historical photos in their store décor. Look carefully for these when you visit and see if you can identify who the folks are and where the photos were taken. Ken and Barbara Stinger are the curators of our images so we can quickly respond when requests like these are made. A small fee is charged in most cases.

Yvonne Addington facilitated Cabela's search for replicas of ancient animal artifacts they could include in store exhibits. THS friends who are part of the Willamette Valley Pleistocene Project and North American Research Group offered replicas of their finds which are now on display for thousands of customers who are expected to visit this popular store annually.

Marquis Company's new care center at the site of the 1939 elementary school has incorporated old bricks and maple flooring from the original gymnasium in the décor of their campus. More architectural pieces will be used in future phases. We appreciate project liaison Scott Miller's efforts to keep their commitment made to THS when the site was purchased several years ago.

Looking Ahead in 2015

A major effort launched in 2014 will still be continuing into the new year: revising and digitizing the popular *Tualatin from the Beginning* comprehensive history volume originally edited by Karen Lafky Nygaard and Loyce Martinazzi. Only a handful of the books are left. Preparing to reprint is a major effort. Rhonda Verbeck, our THC staff assistant, is retyping each chapter then editor Loyce makes any updates and corrections. Using the same photos from that original book has been complicated since several pictures were originally loaned to make the first book but then returned to the owners before scanning technology was available. The book will be printed by a Tualatin women-owned printing firm. Stay tuned!

Volunteers are preserving our valuable relics to assure their permanent conservation. Mike Full, with other paleontology enthusiasts, has joined the two pieces of our mastodon tusk so it once again looks like the day John (Bobby) George dug it from the Fred Meyer wetlands in 1962. Discussions are underway on how to make castings of some of these antiquities so they can be touched by visitors (maybe at the Library) and taken to schools for presentations.

We are dusting off the recording equipment purchased under an earlier grant and hope to continue collecting oral histories from anyone with stories to tell about life in Tualatin. Your involvement as an interviewer and a storyteller will help preserve these memories. We even have kits you can take home and do it yourself. Training is available.

More projects still underway include changes in Heritage Center interior design and a map leading folks to historic homes where signs were erected in 2013. Our Center enjoyed a complete exterior repainting this past year and we anticipate a new roof in 2015, these last two major expenses included in the City of Tualatin budget, owners of the building we have operated these past 8 years.

We are pleased to have served on your Board of Directors this year and look forward to your participation in THS activities during the months ahead. We also look forward to new members who will be joining the Board after the November 2 election.

SUBJECT: Consideration of <u>Resolution No. 5228-15</u> to Allow Parking on SW Old

Tualatin-Sherwood Road Except Where Prohibited by a Traffic Control Device

ISSUE BEFORE THE COUNCIL:

Consideration of **Resolution 5228-15** to allow parking on SW Old Tualatin- Sherwood Road, except where a traffic control device prohibits stopping, standing, or parking.

RECOMMENDATION:

Consider **Resolution 5228-15** to allow parking on SW Old Tualatin— Sherwood Road, except where a traffic control device prohibits stopping, standing, or parking.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY:

Tualatin Municipal Code (TMC) 8-3-030 provides that the Council is to exercise traffic authority by adopting a resolution. Consistent with TMC 8-3-030, this resolution allows parking on SW Old Tualatin-Sherwood Road, except where a traffic control device prohibits stopping, standing, or parking. The resolution also authorizes the City Manager, or the City Manager's designee, to determine the appropriate type of traffic control device to use, such as a sign, and the location of those devices. The City will use traffic patterns and safety considerations to determine appropriate locations.

Currently, parking is allowed on SW Old Tualatin-Sherwood Road without restriction. Parked cars near the intersection of SW Old Tualatin-Sherwood Road and SW 89th Avenue have caused traffic and safety issues by reducing the turning radius of trucks entering and exiting local businesses. Willamette Graystone, located at the end of SW 89th Avenue, has experienced difficulty getting trucks to and from SW Old Tualatin-Sherwood Road because of parked cars near the intersection of SW Old Tualatin-Sherwood Road and SW 89th Avenue. Willamette Graystone has been working with neighboring businesses and City staff to find a solution to these traffic and safety issues. Willamette Graystone gathered signatures of neighboring property owners and businesses and submitted a petition to the City requesting the City regulate parking on SW Old Tualatin-Sherwood Road. City staff has discussed the proposal and believes alleviating the safety and traffic issues through a "no parking" area is achievable

with traffic control devices.

City staff has already identified a need to regulate parking at the northwest bend of SW Old Tualatin-Sherwood Road and the intersection with SW 89th Avenue to allow trucks to maneuver the turn. City staff will review for other safety or traffic issues along SW Old Tualatin-Sherwood Road and determine if additional locations require parking restrictions.

OUTCOMES OF DECISION:

Approving the resolution would allow parking on SW Old Tualatin-Sherwood Road except where a traffic control device prohibits stopping, standing, or parking.

RESOLUTION NO. 5228-15

A RESOLUTION PROHIBITING PARKING ON SW OLD TUALATIN – SHERWOOD ROAD WHERE DESIGNATED BY A TRAFFIC CONTROL DEVICE

WHEREAS, Tualatin Municipal Code (TMC) 8-3-030 provides that the Council is to exercise traffic authority by resolution; and

WHEREAS, the Council wants to change the prohibited parking on SW Old Tualatin – Sherwood Road.

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF TUALATIN, OREGON, that:

Section 1. No person may stop, stand, or park a vehicle on SW Old Tualatin – Sherwood Road at any place where a traffic control device prohibits stopping, standing, or parking.

Section 2. The City Manager, or the City Manager's designee, is authorized to determine locations and placement of any traffic control device to prohibit stopping, standing, or parking to carry out the provisions of Section 1 of this resolution.

Section 3. This resolution is effective upon adoption.


