In compliance with the Americans With Disabilities Act, if you need special assistance to participate in this meeting, you should contact Administration at 503.691.3011. Notification thirty-six (36) hours prior to the meeting will enable the City to make reasonable arrangements to assure accessibility to this meeting.

PROCESS FOR LEGISLATIVE PUBLIC HEARINGS

A *legislative* public hearing is typically held on matters which affect the general welfare of the entire City rather than a specific piece of property.

- 1. Mayor opens the public hearing and identifies the subject.
- 2. A staff member presents the staff report.
- 3. Public testimony is taken.
- 4. Council then asks questions of staff, the applicant, or any member of the public who testified.
- 5. When the Council has finished questions, the Mayor closes the public hearing.
- 6. When the public hearing is closed, Council will then deliberate to a decision and a motion will be made to either *approve*, *deny*, or *continue* the public hearing.

PROCESS FOR QUASI-JUDICIAL PUBLIC HEARINGS

A *quasi-judicial* public hearing is typically held for annexations, planning district changes, conditional use permits, comprehensive plan changes, and appeals from subdivisions, partititions and architectural review.

- 1. Mayor opens the public hearing and identifies the case to be considered.
- 2. A staff member presents the staff report.
- 3. Public testimony is taken:
 - a) In support of the application
 - b) In opposition or neutral
- 4. Council then asks questions of staff, the applicant, or any member of the public who testified.
- 5. When Council has finished its questions, the Mayor closes the public hearing.
- 6. When the public hearing is closed, Council will then deliberate to a decision and a motion will be made to either *approve*, *approve with conditions*, or *deny the application*, or *continue* the public hearing.

TIME LIMITS FOR PUBLIC HEARINGS

The purpose of time limits on public hearing testimony is to provide all provided all interested persons with an adequate opportunity to present and respond to testimony. All persons providing testimony **shall be limited to 3 minutes**, subject to the right of the Mayor to amend or waive the time limits.

EXECUTIVE SESSION INFORMATION

An Executive Session is a meeting of the City Council that is closed to the public to allow the City Council to discuss certain confidential matters. An Executive Session may be conducted as a separate meeting or as a portion of the regular Council meeting. No final decisions or actions may be made in Executive Session. In many, but not all, circumstances, members of the news media may attend an Executive Session.

The City Council may go into Executive Session for certain reasons specified by Oregon law. These reasons include, but are not limited to: ORS 192.660(2)(a) employment of personnel; ORS 192.660(2)(b) dismissal or discipline of personnel; ORS 192.660(2)(d) labor relations; ORS 192.660(2)(e) real property transactions; ORS 192.660(2)(f) information or records exempt by law from public inspection; ORS 192.660(2)(h) current litigation or litigation likely to be filed; and ORS 192.660(2)(i) employee performance of chief executive officer.

Assistant City Manager Alice Cannon and Building Official Jim Sayers presented an ordinance to adopt the updated Oregon Specialty Codes and clarify the adopted codes in the municipal code. Building Official Sayers stated the State Building Code Division updated their code in 2014. Upon their update local jurisdictions are required to adopt the codes independently and revise their codes to reflect the most current edition on the state code. The ordinance tonight clarifies items including city code administration, grading, alternate materials and methods, appeals, and updates language to clarify that violations are civil infractions.

Councilor Davis asked if the language was specific to building and construction. Official Sayers stated the ordinance addresses a variety of building topics.

Councilor Grimes clarified the adoption of this code is not optional and is mandatory to meet state guidelines. Official Sayers concurred.

ISSUE BEFORE THE COUNCIL:

City Council will consider authorizing the City Manager to execute a Revocable Permit to allow construction of a fence in the right-of-way of SW Alabama Street.

RECOMMENDATION:

Staff recommends Council consider the attached resolution.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY:

A 14-foot wide emergency vehicle and pedestrian access exists within SW Alabama Street connecting to SW Boones Ferry Road within existing right-of-way that varies between approximately 33 and 38 feet wide. There is no planned date for full width road construction. The property owner at the southwest corner of SW Alabama Street and SW Boones Ferry Road, Mr. Eimon, would like to construct a fence approximately five feet north of his property line within SW Alabama Street right-of-way until future construction occurs. In exchange, Mr. Eimon would like to landscape and maintain the area between his fence within the right-of-way to the existing access with plantings as approved by Tualatin's Community Services Department for beautification.

Approval of this resolution will authorize the City Manager to allow Mr. Eimon to construct a fence approximately 5 feet north of his property line within SW Alabama Street right-of-way adjacent to his property until future construction occurs. The property owner is restricted from any construction of structures, planting of trees, or in any way obstructing the right-of-way for future use of public street and underground public utilities. Maintenance of the fenced right-of-way will be the responsibility of the property owner until the street is constructed.

When the City needs to make use of the existing right-of-way for public utilities or construction of SW Alabama Street, the City retains authority to remove the fencing and landscaping with no public costs for removal or replacement of the private fence and landscaping improvements. The

City will not be liable for damage to the private fence and landscaping improvements as a result of pipe damage/failure, maintenance, or repair of future public sanitary sewer, stormwater, or water lines within the right-of-way.

RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING THE CITY MANAGER TO EXECUTE A REVOCABLE PERMIT TO ALLOW CONSTRUCTION OF A FENCE IN RIGHT-OF-WAY FOR SW ALABAMA STREET

WHEREAS, there is currently no construction timeline for construction of SW Alabama Street; and

WHEREAS, Mr. Eimon has requested to place a fence over the right-of-way, which is adjacent to Mr. Eimon's property located at the southwest corner of SW Boones Ferry Road and SW Alabama Street, 22475 SW Boones Ferry Road, until such time as the City uses the right-of-way; and

WHERAS, Mr. Eimon has requested to plant and maintain to City specifications the right-of-way between his fence and the paved access within SW Alabama Street;

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF TUALATIN, OREGON, that:

Section 1. The City Manager is authorized to execute a Revocable Permit, which is attached as Exhibit 1 and incorporated by reference.

Section 2. The City Manager is authorized to revoke the permit at any time and for any reason deemed appropriate by the City Manager.

Section 3. This resolution is effective upon adoption.

REVOCABLE PERMIT (Right-of-Way)

The City of Tualatin ("City"), pursuant to Resolution No. 5247-15, hereby grants Mark and Tanya Eimon ("Permitee") the right to encroach upon and occupy a portion of public right-of-way, as more particularly described in Exhibit A ("Legal Description") and as depicted on Exhibit B ("Map") for the purpose of Fencing and landscaping to City specifications within SW Alabama Street north of 22475 SW Boones Ferry Road ("Encroachment"), subject to the terms and conditions set forth herein.


The City grants the permit on the condition that Permitee promises and agrees to comply with the following terms, conditions, and restrictions:

- 1. The Encroachment must comply with all applicable Codes of the City of Tualatin including, but not limited to, structural safety, traffic, sanitation, land use, and fire requirements.
- 2. Permitee agrees to comply with the plans and specifications approved by the City and all applicable permits.
- 3. The street tree species may be either Scanlon/Bowhall Maple and Eastern Redbud. The shrub species and general theme should at least be similar to the design concepts used around the house and to include the following: Barbery, Viburnum, Knockout Rose, Lavender, Feather Reed Grass.

- 4. Permitee must maintain the Encroachment in good order and must immediately notify the City of any dangers to person or property, or any dangerous conditions, that exist with regard to the Encroachment, which are either known or discovered by Permitee.
- 5. Permittee is responsible for installing and maintaining an automatic irrigation system, for providing water and all materials, and for maintaining landscaping within the right-of-way.
- 6. Permitee assumes all risk of damage to its Encroachment, and any buildings, structures, utilities, or other appurtenances connected to the Encroachment, resulting from, or arising out of, any and all uses of the public right-of-way by the City, its officers, employees, agents, and the general public.
- 7. Permitee must defend, indemnify, and hold harmless the City, its officers, agents, and employees, against any and all claims for damages of any kind caused or alleged to have been caused as a result of the Encroachment or this Permit, whether such damage or injury results from normal operation or accident or any other cause.
- 8. The placing of the Encroachment in a portion of the aforesaid public right-of-way will not give to Permitee, or anyone else, any permanent right to its continued or exclusive occupancy.
- 9. This Permit is revocable for any reason and, when requested to do so by the City, Permitee, at Permitee's own expense, will remove the Encroachment from City's right-of-way; and, failing to do so, the City may cause removal of the Encroachment at the cost and expense of Permitee.
- 10. Permitee's obligations under the provisions of this Permit are binding upon all of the heirs, successors, and assigns of Permitee.
- 11. In the event Permitee includes more than one person or entity, all such persons or entities are jointly and severally liable for all conditions herein.
- 12. Any private construction within the right-of-way requires a Public Works Permit and compliance with all applicable codes and regulations.



An airline, railroad, or tour boat may sell and serve distilled spirits, malt beverages, wine, and cider for consumption on the licensed premises. Food service required.

Other Public Location

Sell and serve distilled spirits, malt beverages, wine, and cider for consumption at that location, where the predominant activity is not eating or drinking (for example an auditorium; music, dance, or performing arts facility; banquet or special event facility; lodging fairground; sports stadium; art gallery; or a convention, exhibition, or community center). Food service required.

Private Club

Sell and serve distilled spirits, malt beverages, wine, and cider for consumption at that location, but only for members and guests. Food service required.

LIMITED ON-PREMISES SALES

Sell and serve malt beverages, wine, and cider for onsite consumption. Allows the sale of malt beverages in containers (kegs) for off-site consumption. Sell malt beverages for off-site consumption in securely covered containers provided by the customer.

OFF-PREMISES SALES

Sell factory-sealed containers of malt beverages, wine, and cider at retail to individuals in Oregon for consumption off the licensed premises. Eligible to provide sample tastings of malt beverages, wine, and cider for consumption on the premises. Eligible to ship manufacturer-sealed containers of malt beverages, wine, or cider directly to an Oregon resident.

BREWERY PUBLIC HOUSE

Make and sell malt beverages. Import malt beverages into and export from Oregon. Distribute malt beverages directly to retail and wholesale licensees in Oregon. Sell malt beverages made at the business to individuals for consumption on or off-site.

WINERY

Must principally produce wine or cider in Oregon. Manufacture, store, and export wine and cider. Import wine or cider *If bottled, the brand of wine or cider must be owned by the licensee*. Sell wine and cider to wholesale and retail licensees in Oregon. Sell malt beverages, wine, and cider to individuals in Oregon for consumption on or off-site.

2014-15 ANNUAL REPORT

Tualatin Arts Advisory Committee

1. BACKGROUND

The Tualatin Arts Advisory Committee (TAAC) was established by Ordinance 815-90, adopted by Council in 1990 and incorporated into the Tualatin Municipal Code as Chapter 11-5. The enabling ordinance requires the TAAC to file an annual report with the Council including a summary of the committee's activities during the preceding fiscal year and other matters and recommendations the committee deems appropriate.

Members of the TAAC during FY 2014-15 include Buck Braden, Art Barry, Gary Thompson, Dawn Upton, Kristin Erickson, Brett Hamilton and Mason Hall. The Council Liaison is Frank Bubenik.

3. ACTIONS AND ACCOMPLISHMENTS IN SUPPORT OF ROLES IN 2014-15

- A. Stimulate Private and Public Support for Programs and Activities in the Arts
 - 1. Produce Arts Programs
 - a) ArtSplash 2014

ArtSplash 2014, Tualatin's 19th annual Art Show and Sale, was held at the Tualatin Commons July 18-20, 2014. Thirty-nine local artists sold almost \$17,000 of art. The net revenue from sales in 2014 was approximately \$4,500 after expenses. This revenue was accomplished with local donations and volunteer support. These proceeds are used to support ArtSplash and other programs of the TAAC. More than thirty volunteers donated their time and energy to support this community event.







Over 2,000 enthusiasts attended the threeday event that was filled with art, music, and activities for children. The musical group New Horizons played a complimentary concert and children were invited to participate in a free art activity called Chalk It Up. Fine Art Starts sponsored a kids art workshop which featured free art projects for children.

b) Concerts on the Commons 2014

The Concerts on the Commons weekly outdoor summer concert series held at the Tualatin Commons every Friday night during July and August continued to be sponsored by the TAAC and 33 other local businesses. The concerts in summer 2014 were funded with \$17,000 in monetary and in-kind sponsorships.



Ten concerts were held in a variety of genres with each concert attended by an average of 1,000 people of all ages.

c) ArtWalk

Artwalk is a self-guided tour of Tualatin's diverse public art, natural and cultural history throughout the downtown Tualatin area on four independent and interconnected marked trails.

The Ice Age Discovery Trail Master Plan, which is an extension of the ArtWalk to explore and educate the public about the Ice Age Floods, has been completed and work on land acquisition and easements to build the trail continue.

Updates to the ArtWalk directional poles and a new Giant Sloth and Ice Age Erratic interpretive panels were installed in June 2015.





d) Visual Chronicle

The purpose of the Tualatin Visual Chronicle is to create a visual record of Tualatin in various mediums including prints, drawings, paintings and photographs which document the life of the Tualatin community, capturing elements of the past and present, thereby providing an archival record and resource. The Chronicle was started in 1995.

The City now has over 220 pieces of art in the Visual Chronicle which has three sections: General Collection, Historical Collection, and Student Collection.

General and Historical Collections



Student Collection

In partnership with Tualatin High School, 2014-15 marks the eighth year of the student section of the Visual Chronicle. Councilor Frank Bubenik presented the students with awards at a reception held at the Tualatin Public Library Teen Room on May 28, 2015.

Students in grades 9 through 12 at Tualatin High School participated in the program. Along with their submitted artwork, students were asked to submit a short essay describing their art and explaining why they chose the location of their project. This year the program received an unprecedented number of entries- almost fifty.

2. Partnership in support of arts in the community

TAAC partners with the Tualatin Heritage Center to support art programs. The annual contribution of \$1,000 allows the Heritage Center to offset their building rental costs and helps to provide high-quality creative art programs, performances, and exhibits.





3. Contributions to other arts organizations

The Arts Advisory Committee made direct contributions this year to five outside agencies who make significant contributions to the arts in Tualatin:

- a. \$100 to Broadway Rose Theatre Company, a local non-profit theater group
- b. \$280 to Konty Enterprises Inc., providing School of Rock guitar lessons for children
- c. \$200 to Mask & Mirror Community Theatre, a community theatre group promoting arts in Tigard Tualatin area
- d. \$200 to S & A Irish Entertainment and Events, a community group providing music, workshops and dance
- e. \$220 to Willowbrook Arts Camp, an art organization providing camp for children in Brown's Ferry Park every summer

B. Encourage Greater Opportunities for Recognition of Arts in Tualatin

1. Living Room Gallery



The purpose of the Living Room Gallery is to support and encourage the pursuit and appreciation of creativity by displaying the finest examples of artwork created in and around our community. It provides an opportunity to honor and celebrate cultural aspects of our community.

The exhibit space is located in the central fireplace area at the Tualatin Library. The first artist display was in June 2012. Art exhibits are currently featured for 3-6 month display periods. Thirteen local artists have displayed their art in the Living Room Gallery since the beginning of the program.

2. Community Enhancement Award

The TAAC developed the Community Arts Enhancement Commendation to publicly recognize significant contributions to the enhancement of the arts in the community.

Past award recipients include Lumiere Players, Willowbrook, Don Armstrong with McDonald's Restaurants, the Healing Gardens at Legacy Meridian Park and Jeannine Miller with Tualatin High School.

This year's award went to CenterCal Properties, LLC for its artistic contribution of the "I Wonder" bronze mastodon sculpture at the Nyberg Rivers shopping center.





CenterCal Properties also commissioned a children's book, also called "I Wonder," to accompany the sculpture and provided copies for sale by the City of Tualatin, Tualatin Library Foundation, Tigard-Tualatin Schools and the Tualatin Historical Society. Profits go toward the efforts of the aforementioned organizations.

C. Strive to Ensure Excellence in the Public Arts Collection

1. Administer collections management program

This includes maintaining the inventory and ensuring proper maintenance of the current collection, rotating the Visual Chronicle art collection throughout City buildings, and expanding the Visual Chronicle art.

2. Explore percent for art program

As time allows, explore a percent for art option to partially finance public art.

3. Expand public art plan

As time allows, update the Tualatin Public Art Plan.

4. ACTION PLAN FOR 2015-16

- A. Continue to Produce Art Events
 - a) ArtSplash
 - b) Concerts on the Commons
- B. Conclude Improvements to Commons Park for the Lazy River Sculpture

The "Lazy River" Centennial Sculpture was installed and dedicated in August 2014. The final component of this installation is to design and build a pathway, lighting and an interpretive sign for the sculpture. The design for the pathway and lighting has been completed and construction is scheduled to begin in August 2015.





C. Continue to Produce Art Programs

The TAAC will continue this year with a new Visual Chronicle Call for Artists. Staff is developing art maintenance procedures for ArtWalk and other art installations.

D. Support Gateway Artwork in TualatinNear Highway 99/Pacific Highway

TAAC recommends that the Council consider directing staff to explore options for installing public gateways with artistic elements near Highway 99 and near the Interstate 5 overpass at Exit 290.

E. Incorporate a public art plan in the Parks and Recreation Master Plan

An update of the Parks and Recreation Master Plan will be underway in the next year which will include a public art program element.


