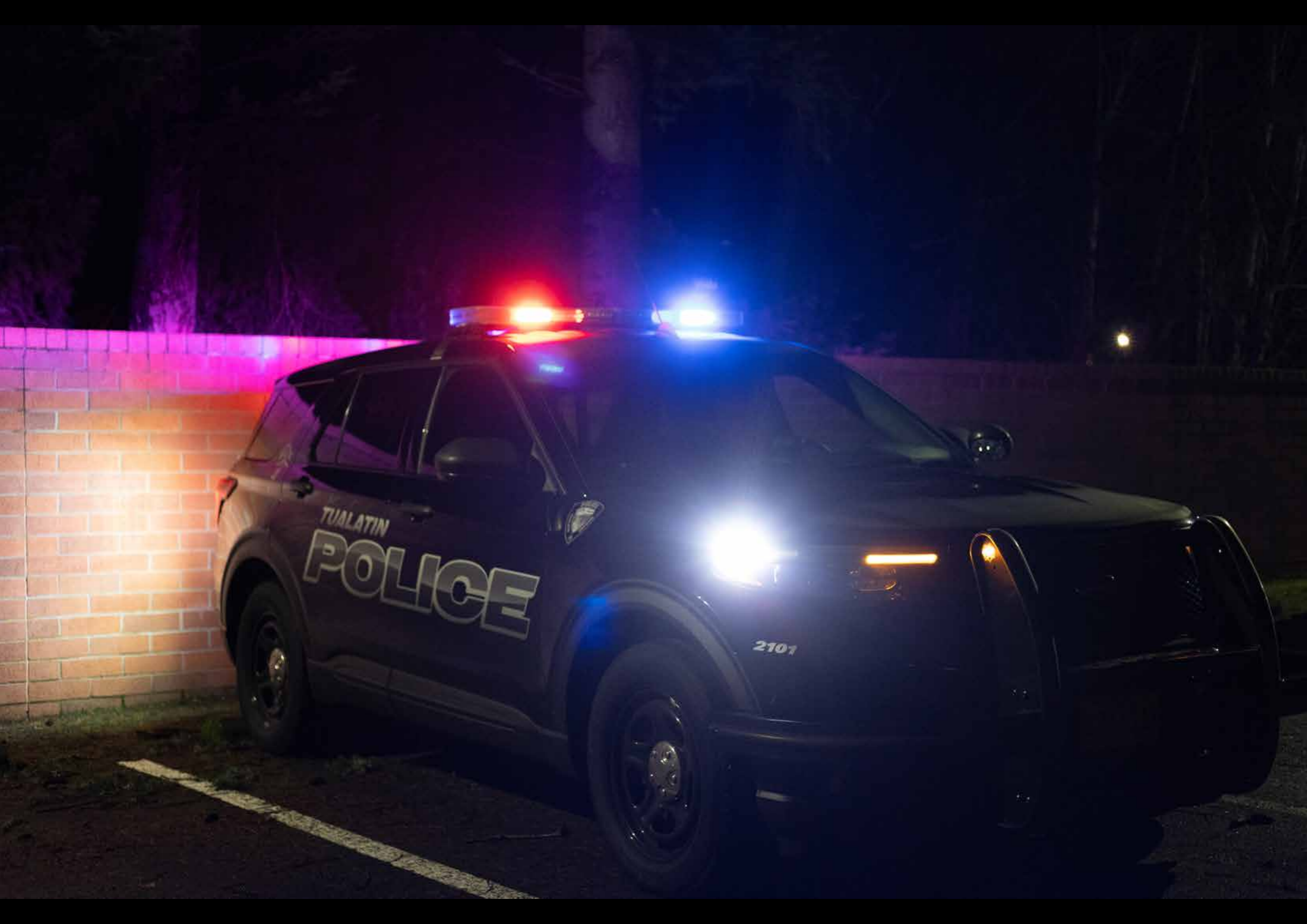

We continue to work as hard as we can to provide a safe and welcoming community. Our core principles are:

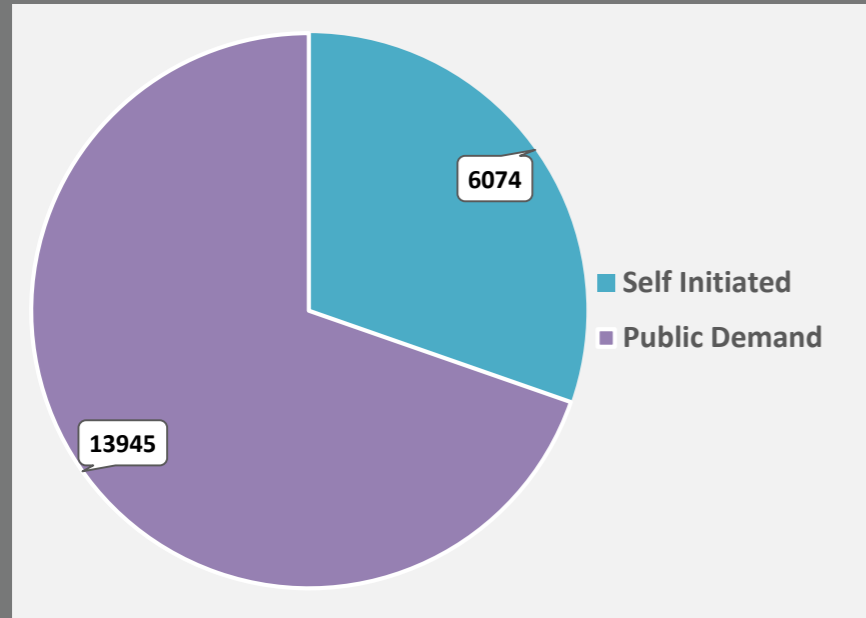
- Providing safety and security,

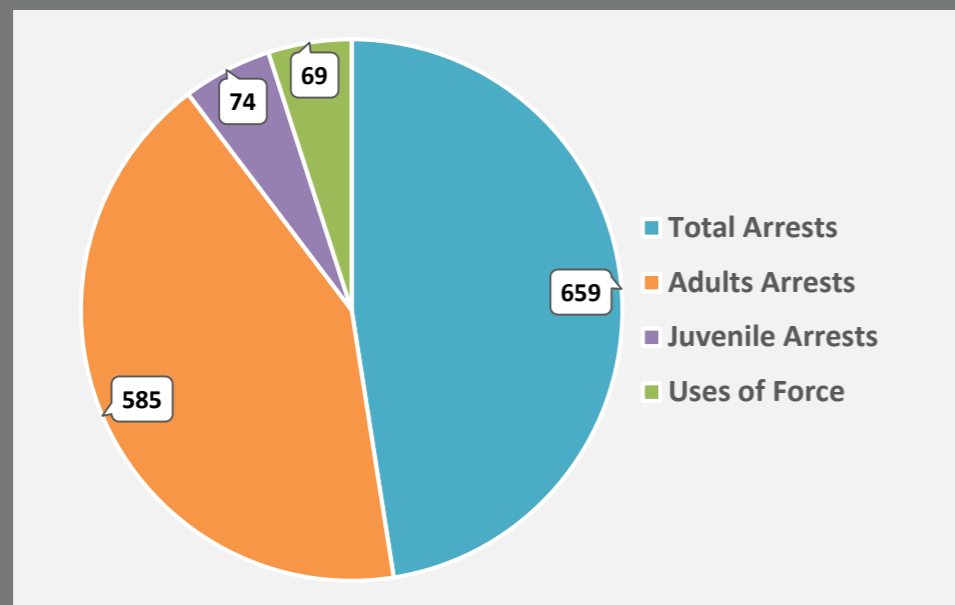


This graph represents all police activity in Tualatin and Durham, including calls from the public and self-initiated activities.

22,491 CALLS FOR SERVICE IN 2023

ARRESTS & USE OF FORCE INCIDENTS



The patrol officers and sergeants are assigned to specific patrol districts where they become an important part of those areas. The officers and sergeants get to know the residents and business owners in their districts, developing a working partnership. Out of the 22,491 calls for service, Tualatin Police received one citizen complaint.

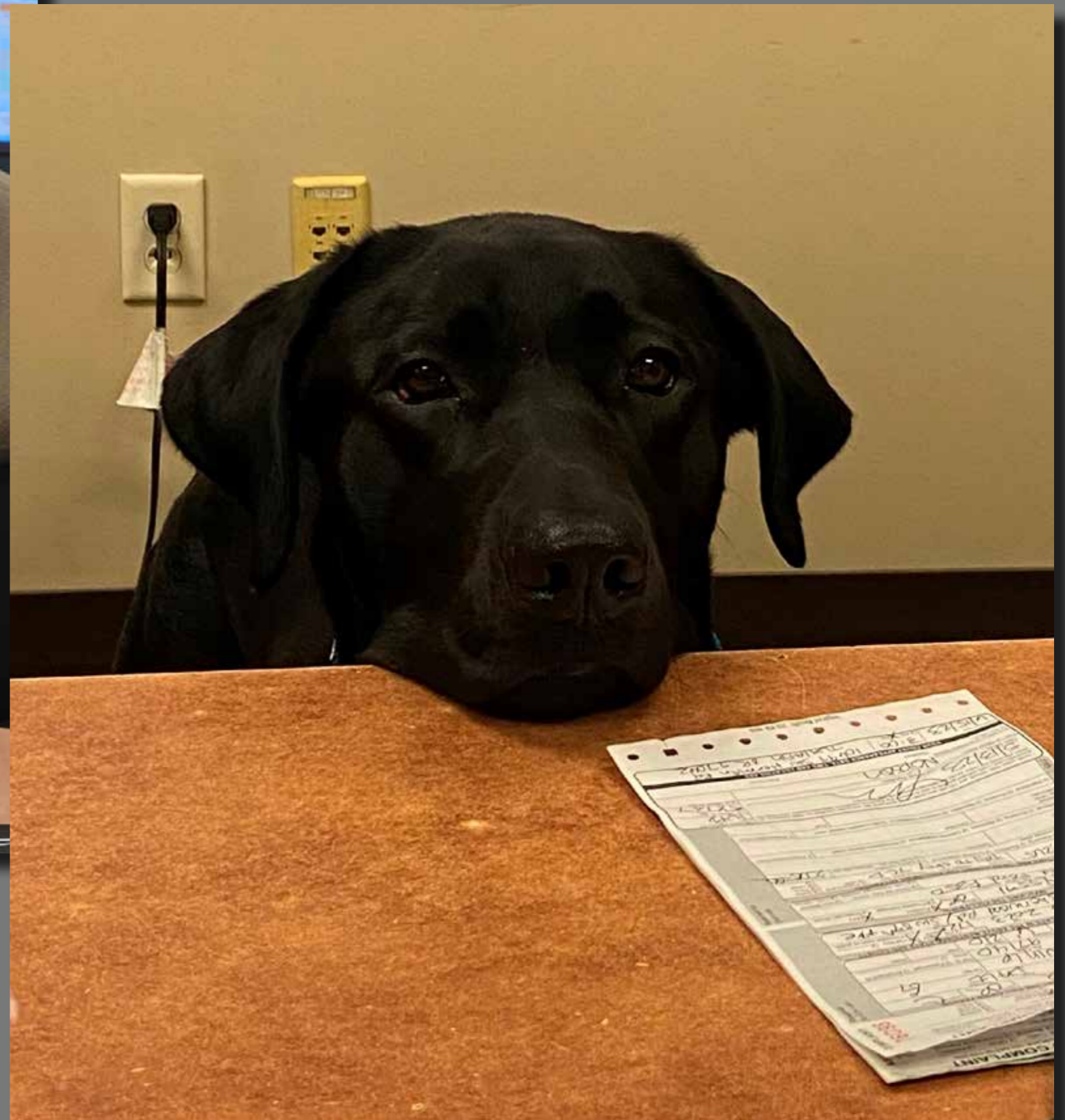
INVESTIGATIONS

In 2023, detectives investigated several assaults, burglaries, armed robberies, sex crimes and child abuse allegations. Additionally, detectives helped investigate multiple Washington County murder cases, and Clackamas County and Washington County officer involved shootings.

Tualatin Police Department received 1935 public records requests in 2023.

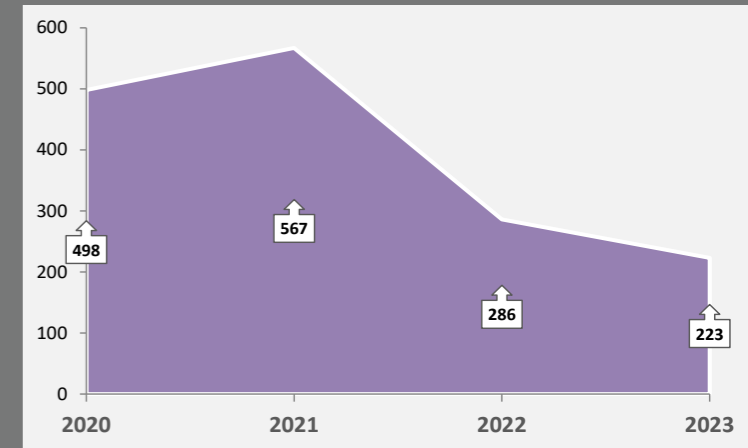
WHAT WE DO...

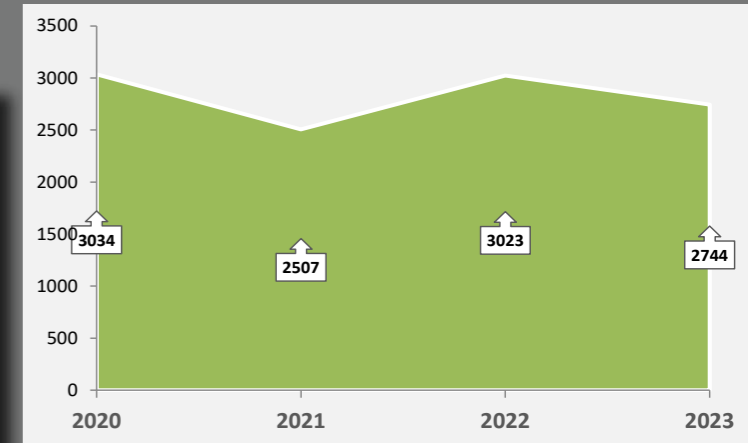
Tualatin Police Services Technicians are responsible for all aspects of document control, to include copying, distribution, data entry and filing of police reports, records and citations.

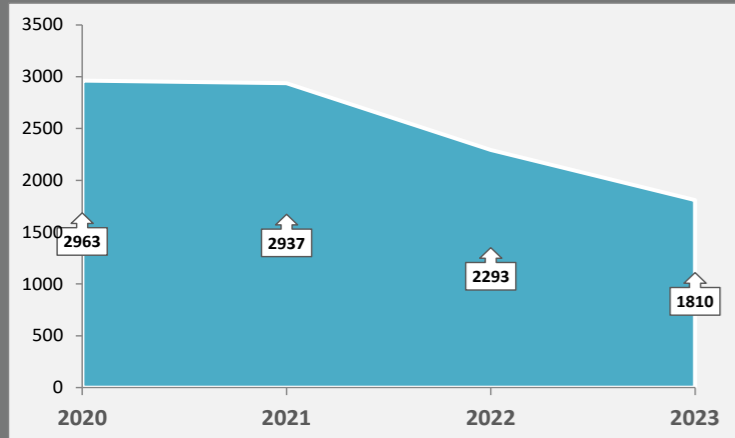
CRIMINAL CITATIONS ENTERED



CASE REPORTS ENTERED

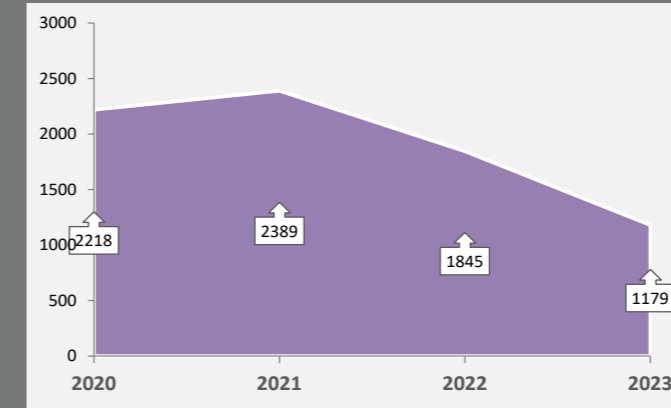


TRAFFIC CITATIONS ENTERED

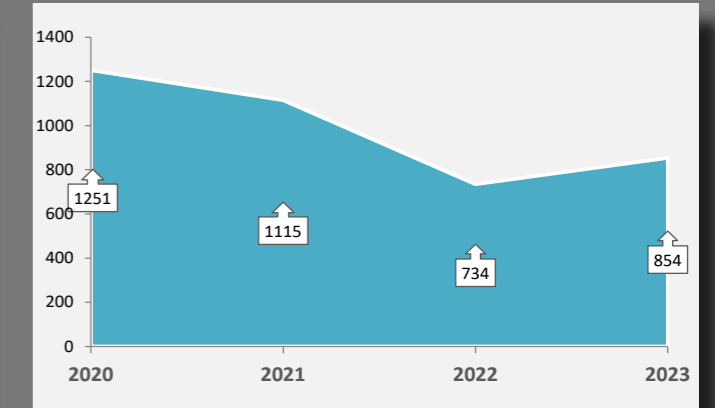




CITATIONS ISSUED BY THE TRAFFIC DIVISION

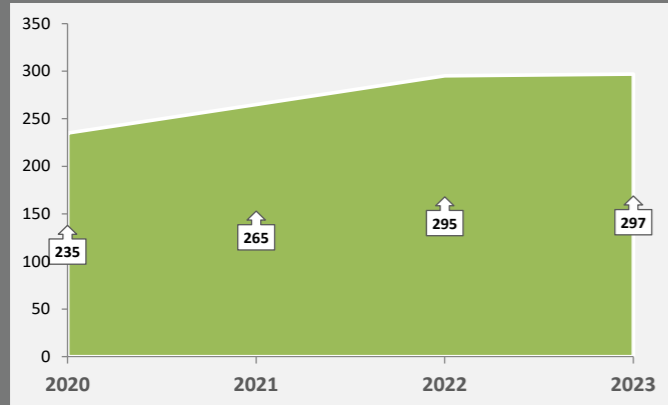


CITATIONS ISSUED BY THE PATROL DIVISION

Traffic Crashes



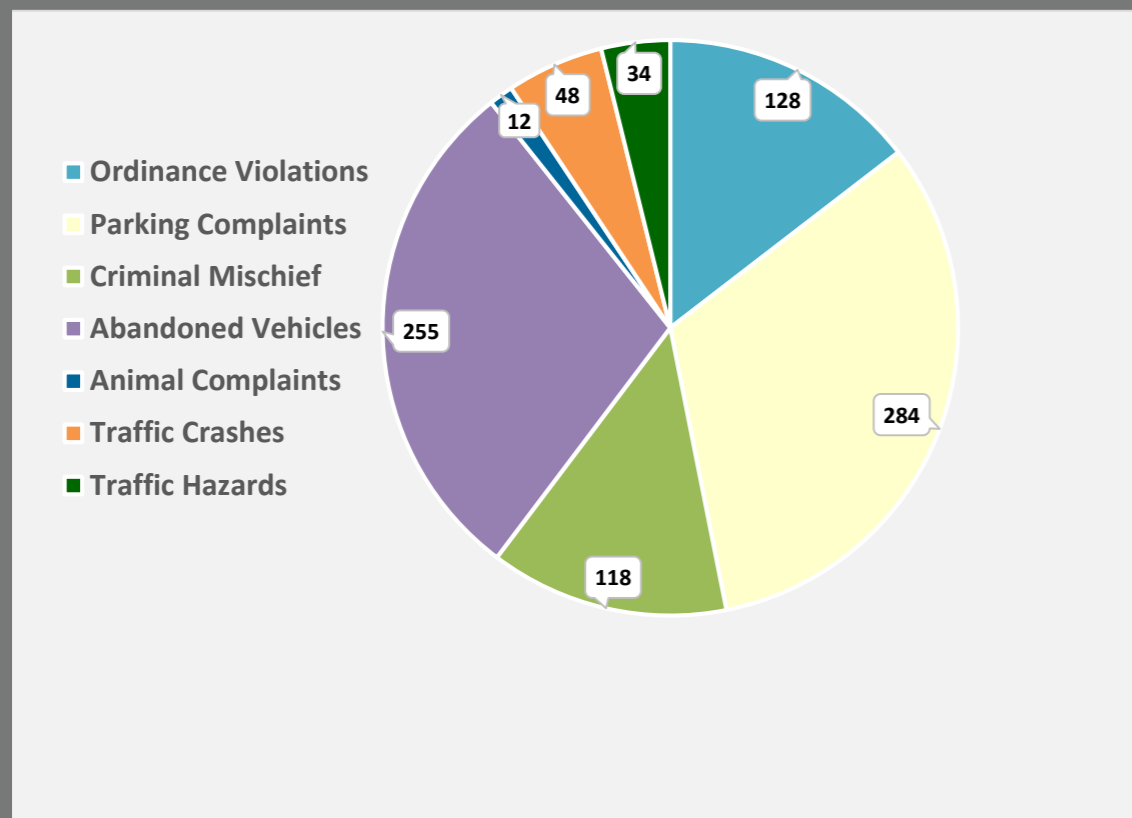
The traffic team is responsible for enforcing traffic laws, educating the public, investigating crashes and evaluating the intersection safety camera citations for final approval. In 2023, the traffic team was comprised of two officers on motorcycles.



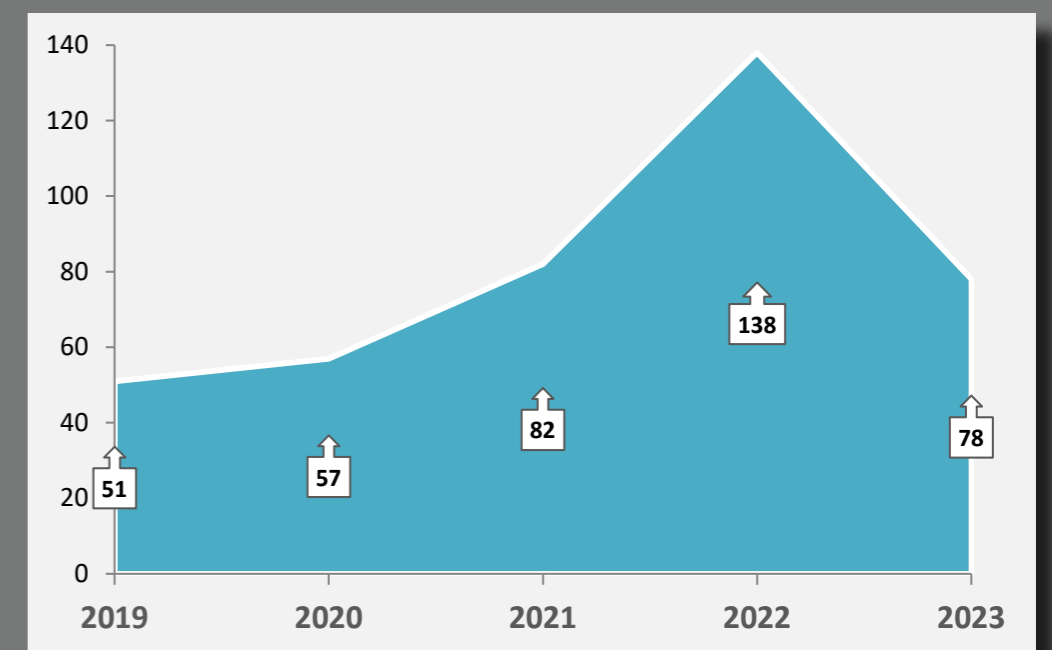
The Community Services Officer (CSO) is responsible for investigating civil complaints and code violations. The CSO's goal is to gain voluntary compliance with city code violations. The CSO also assists with crime scenes, traffic control, information collection and organization, and reporting of minor crimes, such as graffiti.

The pie chart to the left represents the calls for service that the Community Services Officer responded to in 2023. The graph below represents total graffiti reports over the last five years.

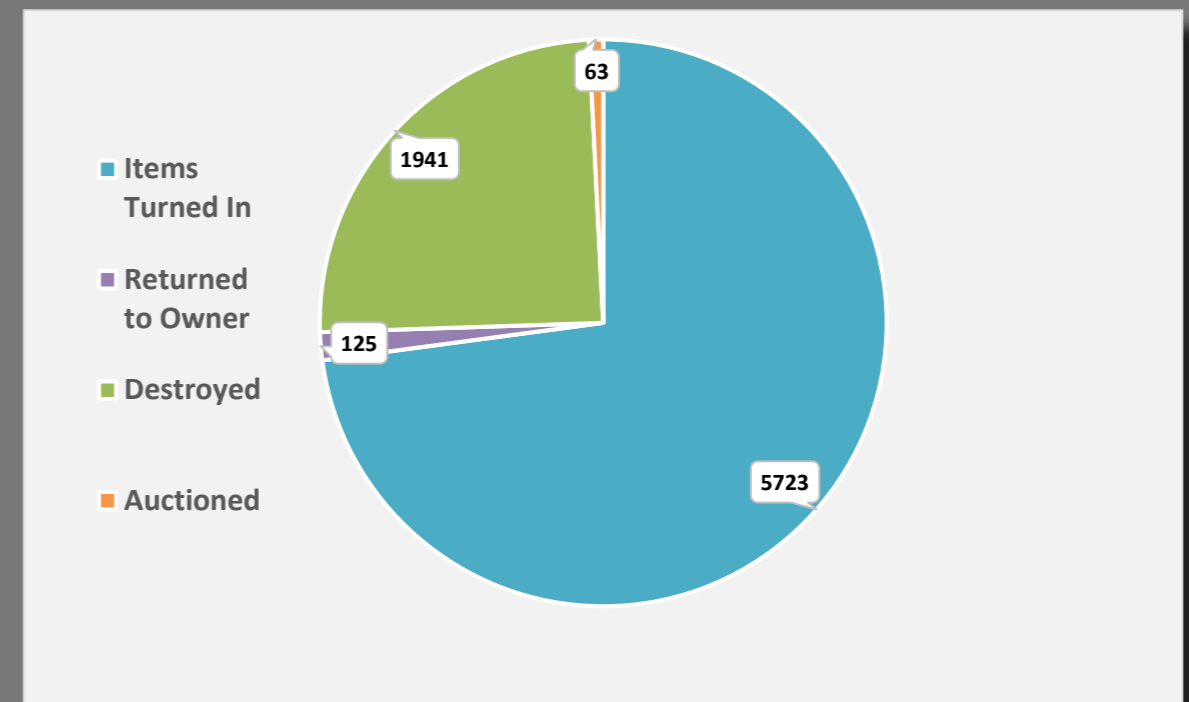


PROPERTY & EVIDENCE

The Property and Evidence Division is responsible for the cataloging and storage of all items within the property room. The property technician is responsible for ensuring the accuracy of all submissions to the Oregon State Crime Lab and maintaining accurate inventories of all high-risk items, which include narcotics, currency and weapons.

WELLNESS DOG

In April 2023, the Tualatin Police Department welcomed K9 Onyx, our first Therapy Dog. K9 Onyx is a 2 year old black Labrador Retriever who was donated to the Department by a local nonprofit, Working Dogs Oregon. He is trained to assist with employee wellness, victim support, crisis response, and community outreach. K9 Onyx's primary role is to be present at the Department as a resource available to officers and employees.

In addition to supporting employee wellness, K9 Onyx will be available to those who are in need of comfort and a sense of well-being, including victims and some witnesses of criminal incidents, and those who have endured emotional tragedies. K9 Onyx is in a unique position to embody the kind of community policing that can improve trust and build connections between residents and law enforcement. Comfort dogs are specially trained to not only provide comfort, but also to be stable in unusual experiences such as riding in cruisers, large yelling crowds, and tense situations. They play a therapeutic role and can de-escalate stressful situations while providing unconditional love and support to people on some of their hardest days.





SCHOOL RESOURCE OFFICERS

During the school year, the two School Resource Officers (SROs) make it a priority to provide a safe and secure environment for staff and students in the various Tualatin schools to help promote a safe, educational environment. They conduct classroom presentations that focus on laws and familiarization with the juvenile justice system. The SROs are responsible for investigating child abuse cases, to include DHS referrals, and investigate local and state laws within the schools, when applicable. The SROs devote their summers to the Tualatin Police H.E.R.O.E.S. Summer Camp, giving students the opportunity to attend a positive, educationally focused summer camp at a minimal cost. The Tualatin Police H.E.R.O.E.S. Summer Camp also promotes the values of the Tigard Tualatin School District with being responsible, respectful and safe.



K9 TONY

In 2023, K9 Tony sniffed 23 vehicles, 132 rooms, and 7 parcels. He located and recovered 5,335 fentanyl pills, 752 grams of fentanyl powder, 350 grams of heroin, 29,960 grams of methamphetamine and \$42,003 in cash.



K9 Tony is tested and recertified annually in narcotic detection standards through the Oregon Police Canine Association.

SPECIAL EVENTS

Tualatin Police and Horizon/Esperanza Community Church co-hosted the 2nd Annual Faith & Blue event in the summer of 2023. We recognize that strong communities are built on mutual respect, trust, and understanding. Law enforcement entities and faith-based groups are key pillars of a local community, and when we all work together, neighborhoods thrive.



Tualatin Police also participated in several local events, including Viva Tualatin, Blender Dash, the West Coast Giant Pumpkin Regatta, National Night Out and the local holiday parade.





GIVING



Members of the tualatin police department took part in giving gifts, clothing and food to several less fortunate families during the back-to-school and holiday seasons. This was all made possible through donations from the Tualatin Community Police Foundation and generous department members, through Tualatin Police Department's Adopt-A-Family Program, and holiday and back-to-school Shop With a Cop events.
